MTSU's Forensic Institute for Research and Education, known as FIRE, worked with seasoned investigators across the country to find a system to guide first-responding law enforcement officers through an often chaotic and confusing situation. Now, instead of trying to juggle notepads,

cameras and video recorders, new officers can immediately document crime scenes — capturing text, photographs, video, audio, GPS, dates and times — with their smartphones.

**Objective:** CASE, which stands for "Checklist App for Scene Examination," aims to serve as a "systematic guide for the new officer who first arrives at a scene," according to the grant application prepared by FIRE's director, Dr. Hugh Berryman, for the Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance. "Time, weather and the movement of essential personnel, such as EMTs and scene investigators, can alter the scene and destroy evidence. Early documentation of evidence can make a difference in bringing justice to both the guilty and the innocent." The officers who are first to

arrive can use the CASE app to help protect evidence for their agency's crime scene unit to handle in

more depth. The CASE app also automatically begins a 72-hour countdown when the crime scene documentation is completed. All data can be securely transferred to an external device, such as a police department computer, and after 72 hours, the data is automatically deleted from the phone, strategically considering the situational context of a first responder to provide a utility that promotes an unprecedented level of efficiency and education, at the time it matters most: on the crime scene."

# I Am Proud to be a Nurse, Wilson. Description:

On a 2010 trip to the University of Botswana to speak to nurse leaders about stress management and self-care, Wilson originated the "I Am Proud to Be a Nurse" campaign to improve the image of nurses in the African nation. "There were rumors of nurse-to-patient violence

in Botswana and they went viral" said Wilson. Funding the project with \$13,000 of her own money,

Wilson designed pins with the message "I Am Proud to Be a Nurse" and distributed the pins to every

nurse in the country. Extra pins were sold for \$5 each to help recoup costs. The MTSU Student Nurses Association took up the cause and held bake sales and pin sales on-and off-campus. The project paid for itself by the summer of 2013 and resulted in seven publications in newsletters and journals, two national poster presentations and a national podium presentation. The 2014 Invention Convention marked the event's 22nd year and featured more than 200 one-of-a-kind inventions from 412 young geniuses from across the Midstate. The young inventors were public- and private-school students in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades in Coffee, DeKalb, Franklin, Robertson, Rutherford, Sumner, Davidson and Wilson counties. Each year, the youngsters create an invention fitting one of two categories: "Games" and "Make Our Lives Easier." Judges select winners in each category, and participants also create presentations as well as working models of their inventions to display to visitors. The event also features a guest speaker each year. Ms. Jamie O'Neal, Country Music songwriter and singer was the speaker for the 2014 Convention. inventions deemed worthy by several judges, each young inventor received a certificate of participation as well as the 2014 featured invention - the golf ball!

The project will create a museum exhibition and supplementary Common Core-based education materials related to the historical archaeology of the Wynnewood State Historic Area. Planned and developed primarily by MTSU Public History graduate students, the main interpretive focus of this exhibit will be the people who lived and worked at Wynnewood, including the Wynne family as well as the free and enslaved people associated with the site. The Wynnewood State Historic

Area, which is owned by the Tennessee Historical Commission and managed by Bledsoe's Lick Historical Association, is a National Historic Landmark in Sumner County, TN, that has recently been rehabilitated after being nearly destroyed by a tornado in 2008.

In the Spring semester, Dr. Martin's museum studies will follow-up by conducting additional evaluation in the form of visitor observations and exit interviews.

A linguistics competition is a paper-pencil test consisting of problems requiring the analysis of a given set of linguistic data. New linguistics problems are created each year specifically for this competition. The competition attracts students with a love of language, logic, and cryptography. Since its inception in 2007, the

competition has grown from 12 participants to almost 100 participants in 2013. The competition was founded by Aleka Blackwell, Associate Professor of Linguistics in the English department.

Crews first unearthed the prehistoric deposits, which could date back as far as 1150 AD,

in the area that will one day become left field for the Nashville Sounds. Fire pits and broken pieces of ceramic pans uncovered at Sulphur Dell suggest that there was a large workshop there where mineral water was boiled to collect salt, a valuable trading commodity. This is the first discovery of its kind in the region. The ball park will be built over the archeological site, but not in a way that will

damage any remaining artifacts.
