Mary Hoffschwelle is Vice Provost for Planning and Effectiveness and Professor of History at Middle Tennessee State University. Born in Billings, Montana, Mary grew up in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and graduated from Chatham College. She earned her MA degree from the College of William and Mary and spent the first part of her career working in the museum field at Colonial Williamsburg, the Montana Historical Society, and Oaklands Historic House Museum in Murfreesboro before earning her PhD at Vanderbilt University. Mary joined the MTSU Department of History in 1992 and served as director of MT Engage, MTSU's second Quality Enhancement Program 2016-2019. She moved to the Office of the University Provost in 2019, where she serves as Vice Provost for Planning and Effectiveness and SACSCOC Institutional Accreditation Liaison.

Dr. Hoffschwelle's research has focused on early 20<sup>th</sup>-century rural reform movements, in particular, the Rosenwald school building program. She began researching Rosenwald schools while working on her doctorate at Vanderbilt University, which led to her first book, *Rebuilding the Rural Southern Community: Reformers, Schools, and Homes in Tennessee, 1900-1930*. Her second book, *The Rosenwald Schools of the American South*, tells the history of the Rosenwald school building program. She is the principal author of *Preserving Rosenwald Schools* for the National Trust for Historic Preservation and communities and agencies to document and interpret Rosenwald school buildings and their history.
